Guidelines for Presentations Lights, Camera, Action: Unforgettable Fashion on the Silver Screen! Fall 2024

FORMAT

Following our historical timeline, each week two participants will give a presentation and lead a discussion for the group, one participant in Session A and the other in Session B in our 9-week course.

- A. Participants will select the topic of their presentations in advance on a first-come, first-served basis from a list of costume designers, screen goddesses, and related topics prepared by the coordinators. We will need a total of 13 presenters, so it will be important that most everyone sign up to present depending on our total enrollment. If you wish, you may double up with a partner so long as all sessions are covered.
- B. There are many different formats you may use for your presentation, including Power Point, Google Slides, videos, film clips, flip charts, and handouts. But no matter what format you use, remember that fashion is a visual medium so be sure to include plenty of pictures and visual aids. If you have garments or accessories that are relevant to your topic, bring them along to show the class! Want to dress up like your designer, screen goddess, or favorite movie character? **Do it!**
- C. To complement the weekly presentations, the coordinators will assign reading material and videos of reasonable length that are to be reviewed in advance of each class. When you present, you may also wish to suggest an article, video, or some discussion questions to the class ahead of time. If so, you can send out this information yourself, or you can send it to Laura & she will forward it to the class. Please try to get this information to your classmates as early as possible (e.g., at least one week ahead).
- D. Ideally **your presentation should be approximately 30 minutes long with an additional 15 minutes for a discussion** led by you afterward, with assistance from the coordinators.

CONTENT

There are many ways to organize your material for this course, whether your presentation topic is a fashion designer from the Golden Age of Hollywood, a classic screen goddess who wore their beautiful costumes, or other related topics. Film costumes have inspired the public with their beauty and originality for over 100 years now and are sure to create a lasting impact for generations to come. With this in mind, you should focus on the following factors in your presentations:

- A. **If you're presenting on a renowned costume designer or a "movie star:"** Consider such biographical questions as: When and where were they born? What were the key people and events of their lives and how did these events shape their careers? For what are they best known or remembered in terms of their impact on film history?
- B. if you're presenting on another topic related to the history of fashion in films: A few of our presentations won't be focused on individuals, but rather on other topics related to film fashion history (e.g., costumes post-Golden Age, movies that have fashion as a theme, museum exhibits dealing with Hollywood fashion). Take a chronological or historical approach where relevant and make sure you highlight what designers, stars, or films best illustrate the points you wish to make. This will help demonstrate one of the key precepts of our course: *That film costumes are a distinctive niche in fashion history -- a unique expression of beautiful clothing that warrants our full consideration!*

RESEARCH

A few suggestions for conducting research on your fashion icon:

- A. **The Internet has a wealth of information** on the various topics we'll be considering. Just enter a search request for example, "Elizabeth Taylor films" or "Elizabeth Taylor costumes" and you may be surprised how much material comes up for your review (e.g., articles, videos, film clips, etc.).
- B. Books and magazines are another great source of information (from the local library -- or try Amazon, Abe, E-Bay, etc. if you care to purchase at nominal cost). Old movie magazines are particularly fun!
- C. **The coordinators will provide a selected bibliography** useful for preparing presentations or for optional further study. Some of these books are owned by the coordinators and they will be happy to loan them to class participants.
- D. **Prior discussion of presentation with coordinators (especially Laura!):** The coordinators welcome the opportunity to meet with you before your presentation to discuss your topic and strategize on how to present it. Meetings can be scheduled in person or by phone or email.

ADDITIONAL TIPS

- A. We will be studying a very exciting topic -- the history of fashion in films --so your audience will be geared up in advance to learn. Relax and enjoy putting your presentation together for them!
- B. **Get organized!** Your fellow classmates will get the most from your presentation if it is presented systematically. Make an outline what do you want to say and when do you want to say it? For example, you could start with an introduction that grabs their attention, continue with an illustrated discussion of your topic step-by-step, and end your remarks with a pithy conclusion that stimulates them to learn even more.
- C. **Please do not read your entire presentation.** It's fine to work from notes but be sufficiently familiar with your material that you can speak to your classmates naturally. Eye contact is important too!
- D. **Rehearse your presentation in advance**. Make sure you can move through your content easily within the allotted time. You might want to get feedback by presenting to a fellow classmate, friend, or family member. Listen to their suggestions and revise your slides/remarks to improve your impact on your audience.
- E. Check and recheck the technology you are using as part of your presentation. Verify tech compatibility in the classroom the week before your presentation with one of the coordinators, especially Laura, (this will just take a few minutes). Various software programs can be used (PowerPoint, Google Slides, Apple Keynote, etc.) for your presentation. Laura can provide further details on this.
